POLICE FIRE EMS

My life was forever changed on November 1, 2006 when my husband, Firefighter Greg Cloud was killed while fighting a house fire. Greg was a volunteer firefighter for the Kent Volunteer Fire Company in Jefferson County Indiana. He also was a member of the fire brigade at his employer, Arkema in Carrollton, KY. He loved firefighting and took it very seriously. In 2005 he was able to go to fire school at Texas A & M for job training, and he was absolutely ecstatic when he heard the news that he had been chosen to go. As with his job, Greg took firefighting very seriously. One of the reasons that he loved it so much was because he was able to help others. Greg never had to be asked to help someone... He just did. If family, friends or even strangers needed something, Greg never hesitated to offer assistance. He loved life, and lived it to its fullest in his short 32 years here. It was this drive to help, that led him to firefighting.

In the early morning hours of November 1, 2006 I awoke to the sound of Greg's fire pager going off. It was not for his department, but for a neighboring one. I knew it was a big fire, and it was just a couple of miles from our own home. I woke Greg up to tell him, and just about that time, his department was paged out as well. Since it was so close, he went straight to the scene. A 13,000 square foot home had caught fire. It took almost every department in our county to battle this blaze. Greg was one of the first firefighters to arrive on scene, and one of the first to go inside. When they initially entered the home, it was smoky conditions, but not a lot of flames. However, things changed quickly. While he was on the second floor of the home, a flashover occurred and his partner was thrown down a flight of stairs which probably saved his life. Greg, however, was not so lucky. He tried to find the door, but this house was too big and had a maze-like layout, and he was overcome by the heat and smoke. A rescue team was organized, but by the time they located him, it was too late. He gave his life doing what he always had done...Helping others.

Greg or I had never heard of Supporting Heroes before he was killed. The day that he died, members of Supporting Heroes came to my house to present me with a check for \$3000 so I would not have to worry about paying my bills and would be able to focus on grieving instead. Not only did they give me the emergency funds that day, they brought me emotional support as well. One of those who came was another survivor. Her husband was a state trooper who had been shot and killed several years earlier. Knowing that someone else understood what I was going through, and seeing that they themselves had made it through, showed me that I too would make it. I was 29 years old and never imagined that I would be planning my husband funeral. I didn't think that I would be able to go on with my own life. I could not see past the pain of losing him, but knowing that she had made it through her loss, also at a young age, gave me a glimmer of hope.

Support did not end after that. A few weeks later, Supporting Heroes met with me to assess my monthly bills, and provided me with a check each month to cover all of my bills. I worked full-time, but would not have been able to afford to keep my house and vehicles, one of which was my husband's truck that I did not want to have to sell. I know that worrying about being able to keep material things sounds like a small thing to be concerned with during times like these, but when that is all that you have left of your loved one, those material things become some of the most important things in your life. Their financial support allowed me to afford them. This support continued until I received the death benefits for Greg and was able to cover my expenses. The emotional support has never ended. Supporting Heroes has been there for me for the last 4 years. The survivor support that I have received has helped me get through all of the times that I thought that I was going crazy, and felt my world would never recover. Having people to talk to who have been through very similar tragedies has helped me to continue on and find the happiness again in my life. I didn't know anyone who was going through what I was. The people in my life were trying to support me and be there for me, and I was so very grateful for them, but they just didn't understand what my life had become. Meeting survivors who did know, was so helpful in my own healing process. They knew what those "bad" days could be like. They could offer advice on what got them through, and just be there to listen.

I was invited to join the Board of Trustees for Supporting Heroes in 2008 which I gladly accepted. This organization had become such an important part of my life. Seeing what they have done for me and for so many other families, I wanted to be a part of it in any way needed. In late 2009, I became an employee of Supporting Heroes and now serve as the Director of Administration and Finance. I wish that our organization would no longer be needed. However, we all know that Public Safety officers risk their lives each day, and as long as there are brave folks like that, some will make the ultimate sacrifice. I hope that it can bring some comfort knowing that our organization will be there, to help these families pick up the shattered pieces.

A Code Moment

Traveling the state (and nation) attending fire schools and conferences teaches us a lot about people as well as our service. We find that people are basically the same all over this land and that members of the fire service have many of the same general habits. An unfortunate habit we fall into is remaining quiet when we see a serious life safety or fire concern and fail to act. We may not act because we don't want to make anyone upset or make anyone look bad.

It is every firefighter's duty to report obvious problems that could affect life safety, either for the public or members of your department. Those are problems which could lead to a fire that could kill one or more of your members or include issues that could delay the public exiting a building and may lead to panic and loss-of-life. If you noticed a significant life safety issue prior to an event and did nothing about it, how much would you struggle with the guilt?

The fire service misses opportunities to educate the public when we keep silent about issues such as overcrowding and blocked exits. You don't have to be a fire inspector to mention things that are obviously outside common sense.

There may be differences of opinion on this point, but a respectful reminder to a restaurant owner that a marked exit is blocked should come from anyone wearing clothing that identifies them as a firefighter. Ignoring this sends the message to those employees that it's not really important except to that inspector that occasionally comes by. Of course, the concerned firefighter should call or send a note to the local fire inspector or chief so a follow-up visit should be arranged.

Fire code violations can be prioritized for severity and we don't want to nit-pick property owners to death and create a contentious relationship, however, proper education, communication and commitment may help prevent another of those tragic events that occur in our public buildings and businesses.

Many of our younger firefighters don't know that the Beverly Hills Supper Club was overcrowded May 28, 1977 and 165 people died. This (re)awakened many in the fire service to those issues, and the best way to honor those people, and the responders that worked that tragic event, is to use those issues as lessons and work to ensure it doesn't happen again.

If you see an obstructed, barred, or padlocked exit that is marked with an exit sign, please respectfully inform the building manager and local fire department so they take the corrective action needed. Further, check your fire stations and the places where we conduct our fire schools and conferences and ensure that the fire code is adhered to and that we don't let violations occur because of convenience or need. We are the same people as our public and may suffer the same fate if a panic situation occurred in an area with too few open exits. You are a firefighter 24/7, show your commitment!

Written testing information is available on the Ky IFSAC testing web site at http:// www.kyffcert.com. Tests are given at the system office usually on the third Monday of the month. Each time you take the written test you must pay a \$15.00 charge. Contact Duane Suttles for more information about written test location and dates at 888-301-2946. REMINDER: Candidates must be at least 18 years of age and be a member of a Kentucky FD or a full-time student of Fire Science at EKU or KCTCS to be eligible for firefighter testing. Candidates must bring state issued drivers license or ID card to skills testing site for positive identification and verification of age eligibility. Candidates under 18, may complete any of the written exams, and may certify to Haz Mat Awareness only. All Certifications are based on the Professional Qualification standards set forth by the NFPA for Firefighters, except Haz Mat, which is a Job Performance standard. Our accreditation is through the International Fire Service Accreditation Congress (IFSAC).

Ken Knipper, Director Bryant Stiles, Alternate Bryant and I continue to monitor and respond to developments that affect our Kentucky firefighters. With Congress winding down its session much preparation is going on in anticipation of changes in the Senate and House that might lead to opportunity for emergency responders.

Ken has been reappointed to the National EMS Advisory Council (NEMSAC). This Council comprises twenty-five people who represent many different EMS disciplines. Ken represents America's volunteer providers. The Council advises NHTSA's Office of EMS and the Federal Interagency Committee on EMS (FICEMS). NEMSAC's work reaches up to the Secretary of Transportation. To date many EMS issues have been reviewed by NEMSAC.

Ken has accepted the Chairmanship of the NFPA Technical Committee on EMS. This committee developed NFPA 450. The committee met recently and is working on a revision of 450 and looking at a new project that would result in a way to evaluate an EMS system. If you have any interest in serving on this committee, let Ken know or go on line and fill out an NFPA application. Please let him know if you use the on-line application.

A webinar on 10/09 featuring FEMA Director Glen Fugate highlighted FEMA's interest in training the public to prepare for and respond to disasters. He encouraged fire departments and other emergency response agencies to utilize the many Citizen Corps programs like CERT, Fire Corps, and MRC. He promised to look into the equipment list as some feel it should be evaluated.

The NVFC has been an active member of a work group that is developing a manual on "Safe Transport of Children in an Ambulance". This project is being underwritten by NHTSA's Office of EMS and Occupant Safety Division. The project is in its final stages and should be available before the end of the year. I will get out an announcement when I know it is available. There has never been this type of guidance available for our fire department EMS providers before.

The NVFC has developed an EMS/Rescue Section. Membership information is available on the web site. The mission statement of the Section is "to provide volunteers in an EMS or rescue delivery system with information, education, services, and representation to enhance their profession". This new section will allow volunteer EMS/rescue groups and individuals to join the NVFC and have direct input into the NVFC's EMS and rescue activities.

These last two items are not NVFC related but are important to our Kentucky departments. I learned yesterday in Chicago that DHS is in the process of developing a grant guide and that the Heart Association's new guidelines will be available on October 18th.

The NVFC Fall meeting is coming up shortly. If you have any items that you wish Bryant or me to bring up, let us know as soon as possible.

KFA Scholarship Committee

The KFA Scholarship Committee is now accepting applications for scholarships. The rules are as follows:

Students must be working on their Associate or Bachelor degree, this program is not for grades programs. These are detailed below.

- 1. The applicant must submit a resume to include:
 - A. High School Grade Transcript
 - B. Secondary Education Grade Transcript (If Applicable)
 - C. Past Employment History
 - D. Details of Present Emergency Services Experience
 - E. Future Emergency Services Plans
 - F. Reasons for Needing or Deserving a KFA Scholarship
 - G. List of other scholarships or grants receiving
- 2. The applicant must provide three (3) letters of recommendation.
- 3. The applicant must be affiliated with a dues paying member of the KFA and must provide a letter of affiliation from the department's administration verifying said affiliation. The letter may also include a recommendation but is not necessary.
- 4. The applicant must provide the KFA with an official criminal background check.

- 5. The applicant must intend to return to Kentucky and serve in an emergency services capacity after graduation. This intent must be so stated in the resume, and serve as a written contract between the KFA and the applicant.
- The applicant must provide the KFA with a copy of a letter of acceptance from the institution they will be attending.
- 7. Any past convictions for any criminal activity will automatically disqualify the applicant.

PRIORITY

In order of preference, priority shall be given to active firefighters or other safety personnel followed by the children of emergency services workers. Extra consideration will be given to persons able to remain active during their college and or vacation time. Additional priority shall be given to students who intend to major in fire science, paramedic science or another safety field. Other majors will be considered if they can be justified as deserving by the applicant and no other qualifying applications are approved. Applicants who later change their major away from a safety field will lose their scholarship but may reapply.

REQUIREMENTS TO MAINTAIN SCHOLARSHIP

- 1. The student must maintain a 2.5 cumulative grade point average. If the student falls below this level, they shall have one semester (not counting summers) to return the GPA to the 2.5 level. If the cumulative GPA is still below 2.5 after the grace period the scholarship shall be rescinded.
- 2. The student must, at the end of each semester, provide this office a copy of their grade report. Failure to provide this report will delay or prevent the following semester's scholarship payment.
- 3. Student must maintain their affiliation with a dues paying department in order to maintain their eligibility.
- 4. The student must maintain the major for which the scholarship was awarded. Any change in the major must be considered by the KFA. If the new major is still within the emergency services field, the scholarship will be maintained. If the move is away from the emergency services field, the scholarship will be rescinded but the applicant may reapply with the new major.

- 5. The student must maintain full time status for the duration of the four year scholarship. Any breaks in attendance will require the applicant to reapply. The student may appeal this rule if the reason for the break as well as the duration can be reasonably justified.
- Any criminal activity, including first time DUI and / or any drug related offenses shall be cause to rescind the scholarship and the student may not reapply.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE KENTUCKY FIREFIGHTERS ASSOCIATION

- 1. The Kentucky Firefighters Association agrees to pay \$500.00 per year to the accepted student. This payment shall occur one (1) week into each semester with half being paid in the fall and half being paid in the spring. The payment schedule may be altered due to school requirements. All scholarship funds shall be paid directly to the educational institution.
- 2. The scholarship funds will be paid twice a year for two years or four semesters, whichever occurs first.



THE COURAGE TO BE SAFE

In this issue of "Smoke Signals" we will address Life Safety Initiative #9 as it relates investigating firefighter injuries and deaths.

Initiative #9-"Thoroughly Investigate All Firefighter Fatalities, Injuries and Near Misses.

The fire service has changed radically over the last 30 years and continues to do so at a rapid pace...but why? We've done a great job over those many years so why do we have to keep changing things. Well the fact is that nationally the number of fires and the amount of damage caused by those fires has continued to increase. This can be expected as a consequence of economic growth however, the real change has come in fatality and injury reductions. It's all about the heartbeat. It's all about the lives of the citizens we serve as well as our own. During the last three years of the 1970's an average of 5700 civilians fire deaths per year were recorded compared to just 2700 per year from 2006-2009. This is a decrease of over 50% and is a truly remarkable statistic. Firefighter deaths have also dropped from an average of 159 per year during that same time period to around 100 for a drop in over 30%. So how was this accomplished? By investigating the causes of these fires and how civilians and firefighters died during these incidents...and then making changes to how we did things.

By following the recommendations of this month's CTBS Initiative, which asks us to investigate fatalities, injuries and near-misses, we are able to gather information in regards to injuries and deaths that could lead to changes in what we do and how we do it. These changes could very well continue the current trends of reduction in the number of fire fighter deaths and injuries. An example of the change might be that 30 years ago the statistics in regards to firefighter deaths would simply read, "156 firefighters died in the line of duty in 1977." This doesn't tell us a lot. Today, these same statistics are broken into categories and sub-categories where we can pretty much put together the exact cause and reason of a brother's line of duty death. Out of these statistics have come hundreds of changes to apparatus, equipment, fire codes, NFPA standards

and department policies and procedures that have saved hundreds of firefighter's lives. For instance, during the 1960's a large number of firefighters were killed by exterior structural collapse. A change in tactics has dictated that firefighters stay out of unstable structures and the establishment of collapse zones around buildings. This change came about by studying how fire fighters were dying and making changes to prevent others from suffering the same fate.

The only way that we can continue to predict injuries and deaths is to look at historic data, including the information that we gather on a daily basis. Unfortunately, many times we are learning from the mistakes of others but the important thing is that we get this information out so that others do not die from these same mistakes. Websites to report incidents include:

www.FirefighterNearMiss.com and www. firefighterclosecalls.com. These sites are also excellent sources of information regarding firefighter injuries and death...

Investigating deaths, injuries and near-misses and then sharing your findings with other fire fighters, departments and fire service organizations will help assure that we avoid making the same mistakes twice and will help assure that each of us, "Keeps Going Home, After Each Run and After Each Shift."

Security...A Whole New Ballgame By Bill Tricarico Director, Loss Control Services Emergency Services Insurance Program

When you think of security at your Fire or EMS Stations, your thoughts usually encompass door locks, alarm and video systems, or secured drug or petty cash storage. But emergency service organizations also handle and store something with sometimes far greater value than material goods, *information*.

The theft of personal information has become as insidious as theft of property. Identity theft costs all of us millions of dollars each year and the holders of such information have a duty to prevent the misuse and loss of it.

Personnel files contain valuable information about members whether they are paid or volunteer. Names, addresses, dates of birth, license numbers, social security numbers and many other personal items, which would certainly be enough to fraudulently obtain credit cards or order goods online in that person's name. This information may also be utilized to develop false identification which may be used in countless ways, most likely for illegal acts. Such identification theft can cause problems to its victims for years to come including ruined credit or false accusations of wrongdoing.

Dispatch centers may have information on location of handicapped persons who may easily become victims to a variety of crimes, medical information that is highly classified, or the location of keys or lock combination numbers for quick entry. In the wrong hands, this information may be quite dangerous.

As a result of these situations, a new look around the station may be in order. Personnel files should be securely locked and key distribution closely guarded. They should not be stored in a place with other files or information. Only people who need to utilize this specific information should be able to gain access to it and the number of people involved kept at an absolute minimum.

If the information is stored electronically, the computer should be set up so that only people with passwords have access to it. During periods of inactivity, the computer should automatically revert to a screensaver with a password necessary to get back into the area that was previously up. This will prevent anyone from accessing the information should an authorized person leave for an incident response or other reason without getting out of the program first. This is especially important for dispatch computer programs containing sensitive information as previously discussed.

Members with access to sensitive programs should be instructed not to use easily broken passwords such as their name, spouse, children or pet's name, favorite sports team, or badge number. Such passwords are easily guessed by someone attempting to enter a program without permission. A recent survey indicated that four out of five people use such simple codes. In addition many use the popular "password" or "nothing." Assigning passwords also seems to do little since many users tend to write them down on post-it notes stuck to the monitor. It should not be permissible to have the computer "remember" the password.

Back-up files should also be safely stowed and laptop computers securely stored to prevent theft of the entire system. In the wrong hands, the information on the laptop may be more valuable than the unit itself.

Recently a state worker in the Northeast was arrested and charged with pilfering identifying information about thousands of people and using it to steal at least \$100,000 through fraudulent credit cards and computer purchases. She was a clerk-typist and obtained the information from documents which crossed her desk. This information was then alleged to have been sold to an identity-theft ring. Bogus credit card accounts were set up which were maxed out without payment.

In most such cases, ultimately, the credit card companies which issued the cards are liable for the bulk of the fraudulent transactions, but such thefts will cause misery for victims because they will have to reconstruct good credit records, a difficult task at best.

Recent federal legislation further enhances the importance of the privacy of medical records, including ambulance reports. This information is quite sensitive and such reports should not be left around for others to view. These reports should be dropped into a secured cabinet which may only be accessed by individuals with a need to do so. Not only would release of this type of sensitive information to the public expose your organization to litigation and embarrassment, but it would be a major disservice to the people you have helped.

Finally, be careful what you do with the trash. Many of the documents required to be kept by an emergency service organization need to be stored for set periods of time, but when they are ready for disposal, be certain that they are shredded or burned. Information on the computer is just as sensitive. When disposing of computer hardware, be certain to remove the hard drive and incinerate or pulverize it with a hammer. The same is true for software and backup drives. There are some commercial software programs which are intended to clean hard drives, however to be certain that sensitive information does not fall into the wrong hands, it may be best to simply destroy it.

Do the best you can to protect the security of your employees, members, and the public who puts their trust in you everyday. Whether your department is a big city career or a small rural volunteer, security has become a whole new ballgame.
