Greetings from the North Pole. No that is just Northern Kentucky. Summer is about to come to an end. Weather up here has been good this week, but that can not last much longer.

Your Executive Board met on November 5, and discussed the many important issues before the board. This legislative session should be an interesting event. David Jackson advised the Board on bills that Gerald and he would be working on during the session.

Department dues have been coming in slow. There are 265 paid departments at this time. There are 10 personal memberships and 37 Sustaining Memberships. Vice Presidents and Directors need

to keep asking at your association meetings if departments have paid their dues. Again, this is a legislative year, which will cost our association about \$23,000.00 for meals, lodging, and food for our two lobbyist to attend the session. The adventures of the Cross + Roads Fire Department

It was a cool Saturday afternoon and we were sitting around the fire station watching TV when our tones dropped and the speaker gained our interest "Attention all Cross+Roads Firefighters, Attention all Cross+Roads Firefighters, we have a report of a vehicular accident at the intersection of Hwy 241 and 2231. Sergeant O'Donnell said "John, grab your stuff and bring your best game these Saturday afternooners are usually ugly messes." I said Sarg "Isn't this the intersection that just 4 days before shift two had worked a pickup vs car?" "Yes I believe it is John." As I was climbing into my seat I heard over the radio "Squad three to control" "Control go ahead"

"We are at the scene of a car vs car at Hwy 241 and 2231 we will be establishing 241 command.." Our engine leaped from the station and as we moved through our town I could not help but see the beautiful fall colors of the maples and thought how eerie it is for such beauty to be connected to what was sure would be a tragedy for someone else. It took for what seemed like a long time to arrive at the intersection. Steam was coming from the front of what was a fairly new looking Buick. Lying over in the ditch was an older Ford Crown Vic. The driver was out and looked to be OK. We pulled a 1 3/4 line for fire protection and Billy Stevens manned it. He was a relatively new man to our shift but was fitting in well. O'Donnell said "John grab the jaws we need to get these people out of the car." I could hear a woman screaming even over the noise of our pumper so I knew something was dreadfully wrong. When I got to the Buick I was surprised to find seven people stuffed into the little car. No one was wearing seat belts. The people in the front all had cuts and scrapes and I could see three head impact points in the windshield. As I got closer I could make out through the noise a woman screaming "MY BABY MY BABY". The screams were coming from the back seat where all four adults looked to be trapped but other than the screaming they were fine. As I approached the Buick my attention was drawn to the back of the ambulance where a member of the squad was placing something in the back. It was wrapped in a blood stained baby blanket and I could tell it wasn't moving. When I got to the car I could see what the problem was. A fairly large lady was clutching a little pumpkin seat where moments before her new born child was alive and well. She had crushed her child against the drivers seat because of two things she was not wearing a seat belt and her child was not in a proper car seat with restraints. What a costly lesson she had learned from life. She screamed long after we got her out of the car. Physically she was fine. Mentally she would most likely never recover. After the wrecker came and we had all but finished cleaning up the scene Sergeant O'Donnell came over "John you will never guess where the people in the Buick were coming back from." "No Sarg where?" "They had just been to the funeral of the girl that was killed at this very intersection four days ago." A cold chill went up my back as I thought "But for the grace of God go I."

When you read this article the holiday season will quickly be approaching and I want to take this opportunity to wish each of you a Blessed and Happy Christmas Season.



WINTER FIREFIGUTING TIPS

Winter comes with its own set of special hazards. Aside from the weather many residences have increased fuel loads from alternative heat sources. It is not uncommon to find 10-15 gallons of kerosene stored inside of a property. Propane heaters and fireplaces are now common. Electric heathers can place an unusually heavy load on residential electrical systems. Home heating systems may not have been serviced properly. Homes may be sealed up tighter then normal presenting a carbon monoxide hazard.

Here are some practical tips for winter firefighting

- √ Take the time to dress warmly, dress in layers.

 Take the time to provide ear protection, gloves, and warm footwear. Keep an extra set of clothes in your vehicle or at the station.
- √ If responding from home take the time to clean the windshield of your vehicle completely.
- √ Drive with extra care. A fresh layer of snow may hide an ice covered roadway.
- Carry blankets in the front seat of your apparatus or personal vehicle. Covering wreck or fire victim with a cold blanket could cause shock. Try setting on them (the blankets), your body heat will warm them up.
- √ To help prevent fire pump freeze up keep water circulating. This can be done using the tank fill and pump to tank valve.
- Hand held radios need to be protected from freezing water. This might cause the radio to key up and inhibit normal radio traffic.

Kentucky Fire Commission to Host IFSAC Accredited Written Exams Every Month Through June 2006!

The Kentucky Fire Commission will be offering an opportunity for Kentucky firefighters to take any of the Kentucky IFSAC Accredited written certification exams on a monthly basis. Once a month through June 2006, the fire commission will be giving the written exams at their central office in Versailles. Test dates are listed below. Testing begins at 9 am each day, and candidates can take multiple exams throughout the day, based upon the time limits set for each exam level, and to allow for a break at lunch for staff and candidates. Testing will not continue past 4pm each day. Candidates will not be allowed to test unless they register with Christy Rodgers of the IFSAC Certification Program by calling toll-free, 888-301-2946. You must register before the Friday immediately preceding the exam date. Candidate must bring their Drivers License or Official state issued ID card to the test site for identification. Candidates should plan to arrive at least 15 minutes early to locate the facility, visitor parking area, and the room where the testing is being conducted. Firefighter IFSAC Accredited skills' testing has been scheduled for each of the State Fire Rescue Training service areas for the 2005-2006 fiscal year. IAFC and NVFC Offer Resolution to Protect Volunteers

The National Advisory Committee (NAC) of the Congressional Fire Services Institute unanimously adopted a resolution supporting H.R. 3949, the Volunteer Firefighter and EMS Personnel Job Protection Act, at its annual fall meeting on October 26th. The resolution was submitted jointly by the National Volunteer Fire Council (NVFC) and the International Association of Fire Chiefs (IAFC) and calls on Congress to pass H.R. 3949, which was introduced by Congressman Mike Castle (R-DE) on September 29, 2005.

H.R. 3949 would protect volunteer firefighters from being fired, demoted or harassed if they miss work because they are activated to respond to a Presidentially declared emergency. Members of the National Guard already enjoy similar job protection under current law.

"When the men and women of the volunteer fire service are asked to respond to a national disaster they shouldn't have to jeopardize their livelihoods in order to answer the call," said NVFC Chairman Philip Stittleburg. "This bill is the right thing to do for our nation's volunteer firefighters and it ensures that they will be available to respond as needed."

Volunteer firefighters-thousands of whom responded earlier this year to hurricanes that ravaged parts of Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and Florida-make up nearly 75 percent of the nation's fire service. They receive little if any compensation for their services and most of them have full-time jobs away from the firehouse.

New Web-Based Program for Emergency Vehicle Safe Operations for Volunteer and Small Combination Emergency Service Organizations Now On-Line

WASHINGTON, DC. - The Department of Homeland Security's United States Fire Administration (USFA) and the National Volunteer Fire Council (NVFC) announced today the Emergency Vehicle Safe Operations for Volunteer and Small Combination Emergency Service Organizations is now available online. This innovative, web-based educational program includes an emergency vehicle safety best practices self-assessment, standard operating guideline examples, and behavioral motivation techniques to enhance emergency vehicle safety. As crashes from privately-owned vehicles are the leading cause of volunteer firefighter on-duty fatalities responding and returning to emergencies, this program also discusses critical safety issues of volunteer firefighter safety in them.

"Vehicle crashes represent the second leading cause of on-duty firefighter deaths in the volunteer fire service," said Charlie Dickinson, USFA Deputy Administrator. "This emergency vehicle safety educational program will also support the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation Firefighter Life Safety Initiative to reduce on-duty firefighter fatalities, and further ensure that Everyone Goes Home."

This program is a result of one of the partnerships with several leading fire service membership organizations as a follow on to the Emergency Vehicle Safety Initiative, a USFA project developed to reduce the number of firefighters killed while responding to or returning from the emergency scene. "This emergency vehicle safety educational program will enable the volunteer fire service to easily and conveniently obtain comprehensive information in this area while at home or in the station," stated NVFC Chairman Philip Stittleberg.
